
Hi Parents,


Here is what our octopus will look like:




Here are the different stages in creating the octopus:



- 1) Print and cut the outlines (located below) on colored paper or have your kiddo color it (any color is fine).
- 2) Fold the tentacles into a zig-zag shape.
- 3) Glue the tentacles to the body/head.
- 4) Glue the bigger white eyes just above the tentacles.
- 5) Glue the smaller black eyes on top of the white eyes.
- 6) Send Mr. B a picture when you are done. Thanks
